Message from the artist

Sixty-six million years ago, an asteroid known as the Chicxulub Impactor struck the Yucatán Peninsula in Mexico. The force of the collision created a colossal crater over 20km deep and 150km in diameter. It shook and scorched the Earth. Most significantly, the asteroid landed a precise strike on a rocky region rich in sulfur, which was vaporized and ejected along with all manner of molten debris into the atmosphere. It is estimated that the blast released 325 gigatons of sulfur, which blanketed the planet in an acidic haze. This brought about a global climate cataclysm which triggered a mass extinction event, wiping out 75% of life on earth.

Chicxulub ended the reign of the dinosaurs.

Chicxulub also left behind some peculiar scars – cracks in the earth running across the region, forming a maze of interconnected underwater caves spanning thousands of kilometers. These cave systems opened to the surface world in the form of sinkholes, which dotted the Yucatan jungles, called cenotes. The great Mayan civilization relied on these cenotes for fresh water and regarded them as sacred portals to the underworld. Gates to Xibalba. They were places of reverence, sacrifice, and rebirth. Places which make man feel small and rather insignificant.


Long after the Mayans fell, the Yucatán continues to draw healers and seekers with its distinct energy. Scientists and explorers are now finding copious deposits of rare earth and cosmic elements in these underwater caves, perhaps giving us the clearest reason for the region's magnetic pull. Perhaps we are naturally drawn to what we are all made of – stardust.

This collection, which explores these sacred spaces in our planet's womb, has been a labor of love over the last four years. They are, without a doubt, the most challenging and most technical shoots I have ever done, involving meticulous calculation, planning, and trust between my incredible supporting cast and crew. But they are also the most liberating shoots for me, as I am allowed to compose freely on a canvas of pure light and shadow, without the constraints of gravity

The series plays with the duality of darkness and light to explore our place in the natural order against a cosmic setting. The images are, taken together in their simplest form, a meditation on the nature of daylight






